Shane J. Lopez, Ph.D., is the world's leading researcher on hope. His mission is to teach people that investing in their future pays off today. Dr. Lopez is a Gallup Senior Scientist and Research Director for the Clifton Strengths Institute. He is coauthor of the statistical reports for the Clifton StrengthsFinder and the Clifton Youth StrengthsExplorer. He is also the author of "*Making Hope Happen: Create the Future You Want in Business and Life*", which details how hope can be learned and spread to others.

Awards

The Preceptor Award

The Preceptor award is intended to recognize a program director (key person who coordinates and implements a leadership program) who has gone above and beyond, has achieved a new standard of excellence, and demonstrates civic and community engagement.



Juliann Jankowski has served as the Executive Director of **Leadership South Bend/Mishawaka (IN)** for 11 years. During her tenure , the program has grown and expanded at an amazing rate. Under her leadership, three programs have been added, for a total of five offerings. Juliann believes strongly in the power of collaboration and uses creativity to form collaborative partnerships as she brings new topics to leadership program days. Using her collaboration skills, she was an integral member of the steering committee that started the Michiana Diversity Leadership and Initiative. She has continued to serve as a program host and facilitator for this program over the past seven years. Juliann models servant leadership in her day-to-day life with staff, her board and throughout the community she serves. Holding to the tenets of servant leadership and its power to transform individuals, organizations and communities, she has served as a mentor to other leadership program directors in Indiana as well as high school students and young professionals.

The Distinguished Leadership Award

The Distinguished Leadership Award (DLA) is designed to recognize exceptional community leadership graduates. Recipients are men and women who have made significant and notable contributions for the betterment of their communities.



Norma Rist

Norma Rist has been a champion of women during her entire career. A graduate of **Leadership Akron (OH)** Class 2, Rist runs her own CEO consulting firm and is a resident of Akron. As Chairman Emerita of ATHENA International, a worldwide organization that supports and honors women leaders, she created the first ATHENA membership program. This nonprofit group seeks to connect established women leaders and provide mentoring opportunities for emerging women leaders. In addition, Rist worked to bring to Akron a business advisory program called ATHENA Powerlink. Powerlink connects women-owned businesses with a board of professional advisors, resulting in significant improvement and growth for those businesses. Through Rist's encouragement, accomplishments and the entities she has built, many hundreds of local women have advanced their careers, grown businesses and become better leaders.



Gene Rife

Gene Rife is a graduate of Leadership Class 20 and was on the **Leadership Allen (TX)** steering committee for a number of years. Gene volunteered to coordinate and engage the program graduates in activities that would keep them connected and in promoting and serving the leadership program for Allen and Fairview. Officially, Gene served as the alumni chair for the steering committee for several years, transitioning into an ex-officio position on the committee and continuing his work with the alumni group. Gene was the impetus behind an effort to bring all the non-profits together at a service summit and to encourage community programs, volunteerism and interaction among groups for the betterment of our communities and each individual non-profit and service group. Gene has continued working at achieving this goal with a different emphasis each year. He is active in his local Lions Club and other community organizations including the Allen-Fairview Chamber of Commerce.

These monthly teleconference calls are **free** to members to share best practices and new trends as well as network among colleagues with other leadership program professionals.



Center. Furthermore, Sanchez significantly increased event revenue and attendance, Chamber memberships and fundraising
efforts, propelling it to a financially healthier organization.
